

## The Schlager Anthology of Hispanic America

A Student's Guide to Essential Primary Sources

## A must-have set containing a diverse set of documents covering Hispanic American history

The Schlager Anthology of Hispanic America offers a modern, original library reference set covering Hispanic American history from the 1100s to the present day. Modeled after the award-winning Schlager Anthology of Black America, this 2-volume set traces the history and culture of Hispanic America through 150 critical historical documents: speeches, letters, court cases, interviews, government reports, and visual images. The set opens with documents from the pre-contact period, such as the Codex Mendoza as well as Hopi and Acoma Pueblo origin stories, before moving on to the Spanish Contact era, Spanish Borderlands and 19th century U.S. expansion, 20th-century civil rights documents, and ending with sources related to Latinos in 21st-century politics. While presenting the essential primary sources from Hispanic American history, from iconic figures such as César Chávez to court cases including Hernandez v. Texas, this anthology also emphasizes often-marginalized voices, from women to those in the LGBTQ community. The set is edited by Aaron E. Sánchez (Homeland: Ethnic Mexican Belonging Since 1900) and features the contributions of numerous scholars.

Aaron E. Sánchez is assistant professor of history at Texas Tech University. He is an intellectual and cultural historian of the U.S. Southwest, with a focus on the Chicana/o/x and Latina/o/x communities in the region. He is the author of Homeland: Ethnic Mexican Belonging Since 1900 (University of Oklahoma Press, 2021).
